INTRODUCTION - Forerunners and messengers advance the work for restoration in our lives and in our world. While the focus is on John the Baptizer and his message in the wilderness, Malachi's prophesy also heralds the coming Lord Jesus as forerunner of the Lord of hosts. In this proclamation, all the baptized are called to participate in sharing the gospel. In so doing, we prepare the way for the Lord, and we assist all flesh in capturing a vision of the "salvation of God."

THEME AND VERSE (light Advent candles)

We give thanks to the Lord for he has looked favorably upon us and has sent us his beloved son. He has raised up a mighty Savior for us from the house of his servant David. God shows the mercy promised to our ancestors and remembers his holy covenant, the oath he swore to our ancestors Abraham and Sarah, that we might serve him without fear. We are to proclaim the day of the Lord, following John the Baptist, preparing the way of the Lord.

'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.' ⁵Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth; ⁶and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.''' (Luke 3:4b-6)

PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION God is good. All the time.

GOSPEL: Luke 3:1-6

John travels throughout the region of the Jordan River calling people to repentance and baptizing them as a sign of their willingness to accept God's forgiveness and to live a new life. In doing this, John fulfils Isaiah's prophecy of the voice in the wilderness preparing the way for the Lord and challenging the spectrum of political and religious authority.

¹In the fifteenth year of the reign of Emperor Tiberius, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, and Herod was ruler of Galilee, and his brother Philip ruler of the region of Ituraea and Trachonitis, and Lysanias ruler of Abilene, ²during the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas, the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness. ³He went into all the region around the Jordan, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins, ⁴as it is written in the book of the words of the prophet Isaiah, "The voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.' ⁵Every valley shall be filled, and every mountain and hill shall be made low, and the crooked shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth; ⁶and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.'" READING: Malachi 3:1-4

The Lord announces a covenant with Israel. A messenger like Malachi, (his name means "my messenger"), shall prepare the way for the coming of the Lord by purifying and refining God's people, as silver and gold are refined.

¹See, I am sending my messenger to prepare the way before me, and the LORD whom you seek will suddenly come to his temple. The messenger of the covenant in whom you delight—indeed, he is coming, says the LORD of hosts. ²But who can endure the day of his coming, and who can stand when he appears?

READING: Philippians 1:3-11

HYMN

For he is like a refiner's fire and like fullers' soap; ³he will sit as a refiner and purifier of silver, and he will purify the descendants of Levi and refine them like gold and silver, until they present offerings to the LORD in righteousness. ⁴Then the offering of Judah and Jerusalem will be pleasing to the LORD as in the days of old and as in former years.

The apostle Paul was the pastor of many new churches. He writes in this letter about his joy to be in partnership with the Christians of Philippi. Listen to how tender-hearted Paul - sometimes a stern preacher - is with his friends as he encourages them to grow in love and knowledge with the assurance that Christ will complete the work begun in them.

³I thank my God every time I remember you, ⁴constantly praying with joy in every one of my prayers for all of you, ⁵because of your sharing in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ. ⁷It is right for me to think this way about all of you because you hold me in your heart, for all of you share in God's grace with me, both in my imprisonment and in the defense and confirmation of the gospel. ⁸For God is my witness, how I long for all of you with the compassion of Christ Jesus. ⁹And this is my prayer, that your love may overflow more and more with knowledge and full insight ¹⁰to help you to determine what is best, so that in the day of Christ you may be pure and blameless, ¹¹having produced the harvest of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ for the glory and praise of God.

BENEDICTION & SENDING

A new day is dawning! Despite what we see and hear in the world around us, the sunrise is coming. When it comes, it will break through the darkness of our world—darkness caused by violence and death and hunger and despair. And all those who now sit huddled in the shadows will be able to rise and walk with confidence in the light. God is with us!

We live as God's servants in Jesus' name.

This is Good News! God's Grace is greater than our wildest imagination. God's Grace embraces us where we are, drawing us out to be the people we were created to be. God's blessings go with us. And his Son, Jesus Christ, shows us how to live re-shaped in his love. And the blessing of the living Holy Spirit joyfully empowers us in witness. Amen?

Amen! We go in Christ's name, to love and serve!

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Worship, as an action, continues to change. Use this space to guide your thoughts as the Spirit may lead you. Use this time to center your distractions in order to help activate your worship.

This week the focus is on prophecies of God's coming, God's restoration, and God's justice and peace. Yet, in each reading there is a call to prepare to receive the promise in some way. In Malachi, there is the purifying work that will happen when God's messenger comes, and the people are to seek for, and take delight in, the coming one. In Paul's prayer for the Philippians, he expresses his desire for them to grow in love and wisdom, and to trust that God will complete the work that God has begun in them.

Finally, the Gospel narrative of John's coming speaks of John's call to the people to repent and be baptized in preparation for the coming one. The message this week, then, is this: God is always coming, always available to God's people, and always working for restoration. But, receiving God's coming takes preparation, and so God sends a messenger to do this work, to prepare God's people for God's coming.

The challenge is for us to embrace the work of preparation for ourselves – opening ourselves to God's restoring, cleansing and disturbing work, and making our hearts ready for us to become, in turn, messengers of God's restorative justice and mercy to the world.

How much of the day do we spend in reaction? So much pain and injustice are caused simply because we react in fear, anger, self-protection or simply impatience. However, if we can develop a prepared heart, we can more easily slow down, reflect and then act with wisdom and grace.

Preparation – particularly of the heart – is restorative. It's a proactive stance that frees us from ourselves and our destructive or unhelpful patterns of behavior and moves us into a life that more easily considers, serves and brings restoration to others. This work of heart preparation includes the constant discipline of repentance; the constant awareness of God's forgiveness and transforming work; the patience to allow God's work to unfold in a time frame that ensures thorough healing and restoration; and the openness to be a voice that helps others to see God's work.

In a world of suffering and conflict, it can be difficult to remember and cling to God's promises of justice and restoration. This is why the work of preparation, both individually and collectively, is such an important and constant spiritual practice. Only when we make listening and watching for God's messengers a constant discipline can we perceive what God is doing and cooperate with the Reign of God in our lives.

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
