INTRODUCTION

Epiphany embodies two themes. The first is the new vision that the Gospels present of God's grace and love being extended to all people and not just those descended from Abraham. This inclusivity is radical, scandalous, and even exciting. This offers us a wonderful opportunity for celebration in our communities. The second theme is that of going deeper into our understanding of Jesus — an "Epiphany" (an insight, a revelation) of who this Christ child is that we have welcomed to our world this Christmas season. Both journeys are the same, and both offer us reason to celebrate and praise Jesus.

THE EPIPHANY GOSPEL: Matthew 2:1-12

God's promise shines bright in the night as magi follow a star to honor a new king. Strangers from a faraway land, they welcome the long-awaited messiah of Israel.

¹In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men

from the East came to Jerusalem, ²asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of

the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising and have come to pay him homage."

³When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. ⁵They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

⁶'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'"

⁷Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. ⁸Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search

diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." ⁹When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. ¹⁰When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. ¹¹On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. ¹²And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

Before Jesus begins his ministry, he is baptized by John, appointed by the Spirit, and identified publicly as God's child.

¹³Then Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan, to be baptized by him. ¹⁴John would have prevented him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?" ¹⁵But Jesus answered him, "Let it be so now; for it is proper for us in this way to fulfill all righteousness." Then he consented. ¹⁶And

when Jesus had been baptized, just as he came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to him, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on him. ¹⁷And a voice from heaven said, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased."

Amen.

READING: Isaiah 42:1-9

God's servant Israel is endowed with the Spirit in order to bring justice to the nations. The servant will not exercise authority boisterously or with violence, nor will weariness ever keep it from fulfilling its task. God's old promises have been fulfilled; the new assignment of the servant is to bring light to the nations.

Here is my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen, in whom my soul delights; I have put my spirit upon him; he will bring forth justice to the nations. ²He will not cry or lift up his voice or make it heard in the street; ³a bruised reed he will not break, and a dimly burning wick he will not quench; he will faithfully bring forth justice. ⁴He will not grow faint or be crushed until he has established justice in the earth; and the coastlands wait for his teaching. ⁵Thus says God, the LORD, who created the heavens and stretched them out, who spread out the earth and what

comes from it, who gives breath to the people upon it and spirit to those who walk in it: ⁶I am the LORD, I have called you in righteousness, I have taken you by the hand and kept you; I have given you as a covenant to the people, a light to the nations, ⁷to open the eyes that are blind, to bring out the prisoners from the dungeon, from the prison those who sit in darkness. ⁸I am the LORD, that is my name; my glory I give to no other, nor my praise to idols. ⁹See, the former things have come to pass, and new things I now declare; before they spring forth, I tell you of them.

READING: Acts 10:34–43

Peter crosses the religious boundaries separating Jews from Gentiles when he proclaims the good news of God's forgiveness to Cornelius, a Roman centurion. As a result, Cornelius and his family become the first Gentiles to be baptized in Jesus' name.

³⁴Then Peter began to speak to them: "I truly understand that God shows no partiality, ³⁵but in every nation anyone who fears him and does what is right is acceptable to him. ³⁶You know the message he sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ — he is Lord of all. ³⁷That message spread

throughout Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John announced: ³⁸how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and with power; how he went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed by the devil, for God was with him. ³⁹We are witnesses to all that he did both in Judea and in Jerusalem.

They put him to death by hanging him on a tree; ⁴⁰but God raised him on the third day and allowed him to appear, ⁴¹not to all the people but to us who were chosen by God as witnesses, and who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. ⁴²He

commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one ordained by God as judge of the living and the dead. ⁴³All the prophets testify about him that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

This Festival of Epiphany reveals to us who Jesus the Christ is, the one that has incarnated (made into human flesh) himself among us.

There are two clear revelations that would have been startling for the first readers of Matthew's Gospel. The first is that the Messiah has come entirely – for all people: Jew and Gentile, Wealthy and Poor, Oppressed and Oppressor. This entirety is a significant aspect of the Gospel.

And the second revelation is the mind-bending truth that has traditionally been seen as reflected in the Wise Men's gifts: This Child is Royalty (gold), Divine (frankincense), and yet, also, a self-giving Sacrifice (myrrh). All of these passages call us into praise for this, God's incarnation!

Defensiveness and otherness are two of the main characteristics of today's political, social, economic and relational world. In the quest for self-development, human beings have increasingly seen the "individual self" as distinctive and "other than" the rest of the population. Businesses work hard to "distinguish" themselves from their competitors and even nations work hard to identify themselves, drawing boundaries, naming enemies and allies, and putting huge investments into defending what is "uniquely theirs."

In the Epiphany of Jesus, it is revealed that Christ crosses all boundaries, refuses to be defensive or self-protective and refuses to draw lines that separate. The incarnate Messiah draws all creation together into one, and gives up safety, security and comfort so that he might be able to gift it to others.

Every single church community, and every person, longs for the light of God's glory and blessing to shine on them. This longing often leads us into trying to earn God's blessing through legalism or doctrinal purity which causes separation from those considered "unrighteous." Then our faith becomes something exclusive, something to defend against others who see things differently.

Epiphany reveals an alternative view of God's glory – that with Christ's incarnation the glory of God and God's blessing are already ours. This is not something earned, and the experience of God's glory is found in connecting and sharing with others and possibly while protecting and defending the least.

It is a good practice for each of us to ask: "Who needs to be included in our community right now?" and "Who needs to be protected?" – two questions that necessarily call us to show the self-sacrifice of Jesus in our own lives.
