Psalm 72 – Devotional Thought:

Do you ever look around our world and think – about something in particular - "that's not fair." Maybe it's something close to home or something you see on TV. Either way, we see things all the time which cause us to think "that's not fair."

This is the concept of "justice." It is a re-current theme throughout Scripture, especially the Old Testament. In today's reading, Psalm 72, the author asks for "justice" for the King. Specifically, he writes: "Give the king your justice, O God, and your righteousness to the royal son!" This

Psalm is attributed to Solomon ("of Solomon") but at the end of it, it describes this being the end of David's writings, leading some people to think David wrote it about his son Solomon, and his prayer that Solomon would seek and live out God's justice.

Whether it's Solomon's prayer, or the prayer of a father (David) for his son (Solomon), this is an idea for which we should pray for ourselves, our communities, and our leaders at all levels of government. But added to that: our concepts of justice must be Biblical. Just because we think something is unfair or not right doesn't make it so. We ought to ask: What does Scripture teach me about this, and how do I live out Scriptural teachings and Scriptural justice in my life? Pray for yourself and all of those around you!
